

Living in Hampshire & the Culture

Your guide to the region, culture and more...

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1. History and geography

Hampshire is the largest county based in Southeast England, bordered by Dorset, Wiltshire, Berkshire, Surrey, and West Sussex. The southern boundary is the coastline of the English Channel and the Solent, facing the Isle of Wight.

Its two largest cities are Southampton and Portsmouth, it is also home to Winchester, a historic city that was once the capital of England until the <u>Norman conquest</u>. The three cities all host Universities, Southampton being home to the <u>University of Southampton</u> and <u>Southampton Solent University</u>, Portsmouth to the University of Portsmouth, and Winchester to the University of Winchester.

2. Weather

During June, July, August, and September you are most likely to experience good days with pleasant average temperatures that fall between 20 degrees Celsius (68°F) and 25 degrees Celsius (77°F). The coldest month is February with an average maximum temperature of 8°C (47°F). November is the wettest month whilst July is the direst and most sunny month.

3. Southampton and surrounding area

When moving, one of the biggest decisions is to decide on is the area you would like to live in.

Southampton is a fantastic place to live, work and socialise, with some of the best weather in the UK. a. Popular residential areas in Southampton

Highfield and Portswood (SO17) are the areas closest to our Highfield and Avenue campuses, and consistently prove popular with both staff and students. Portswood is the more student-focused area, with a range of shops, cafes and restaurants, whilst Highfield is a quieter, desirable residential area.

Shirley (SO15) is a broad district and a former village on the western side of Southampton, close to the Common and only a 40-minute walk from the university campus.

Bitterne (SO18) is an eastern suburb of Southampton and is particularly popular with families as some schools have been rated outstanding by Ofsted.

Hedge End and West End (SO30) Originally small villages on the edge of Southampton, Hedge End and West End are now larger suburbs with easy access to the M27 motorway and many areas of newer housing, making these areas particularly popular with families.

Totton (SO40) is situated between the eastern edge of the <u>New Forest</u> and the <u>River Test</u>. The town has a good mix of housing, shopping and good transport links.

Eastleigh (SO50) is located between Southampton and Winchester, it offers you all the shops and restaurants you need, but also gives you easy access to the surrounding countryside.

Bishopstoke and Fair Oak (SO50) The area is a mix of residential properties based around two villages together with open farmed countryside and beautiful woodland, riverside and country walks.

Romsey (SO51) is a historic market town and is situated 7 miles (11 km) northwest of Southampton. With good facilities, picturesque surroundings and a strong sense of community, Romsey has long appealed to families and young couples.

Chandlers Ford (SO53) sits between Winchester and Southampton. It is popular with families as there are a number of good schools and plenty of recreation areas, shops and eateries.

b. Nearby cities and their surroundings

New Forest

The New Forest area is a unique mix of landscapes including ancient woodlands, wetlands, and bogs, and it is home to many rare species of plants and wildlife long since lost in the UK and Europe. There are lovely small villages around the New Forest, which offer beautiful walks through the National Park, thriving high streets full of independent shops and a strong sense of community. Winchester

Winchester is located 60 miles southwest of London, 14 miles from Southampton, and <u>UoS Winchester School</u> of <u>Art</u> is located here. Winchester offers history, culture, and fine food. Its location and schooling options have

long been its strong selling points. Inevitably, with so many offerings, the city demand for housing is high and prices reflect this; it is one of the most expensive places to live in the area.
